# CENTREPOINT

## Ireland v Scotland ~ *A Personal View*

The recent International at Castle Avenue to me represented most of what is good about cricket.

This game played over three days is Ireland's and Scotland's only first class match and as such must be the most important game either side plays. Indeed it is surely the pinnacle of any club players ambitions to play in such a game.

However with the sun shining and some determined play a recovery was made which if not of Bannockburn proportions certainly averted Culloden! A good Irish reply saw day one end with the home side slightly in the ascendant.

Day two saw Ireland continue to gain control until that monstrous regimen of spin bowlers somewhat unfairly introduced a little a little early saw Scotland claw their way to a first innings lead of 13.

Another poor start by Scotland raised Irish hopes but again the game swung with Scotland approaching a 200 lead at close of play on a wicket beginning to spin as it wore.

# The Watsonian Connection

A cricketers career is not complete until he has participated in a tour and the members of the Watsonian Cricket Club have been more fortunate than most in enjoying this opportunity.

The Club first toured in 1910 and since then has played cricket in quite a few countries - Ireland, North and South, England, Holland and Corfu - but for some strange reason we keep coming back to Dublin. The early tours were to Northern Ireland, Newcastle and Scarborough and then in 1936 we have to thank our Bob Stewart and Pembroke's Paddy Clifford for organising our first tour to Dublin.

This was the start of a very happy association with the cricketers of Dublin and latterly the fixtures have concerned the same clubs - Clontarf, Phoenix, Leinster, Pembroke, Malahide and Halverstown.

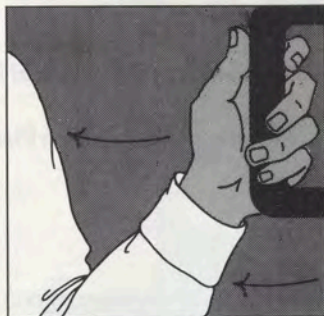
It has always been a problem deciding the best way to travel to Dublin and we have tried many - by boat to Belfast then the express to Dublin; by having a minibus and travelling to Larne (not of course, by driving on water!); flying direct from Edinburgh to Dublin and by bus to Glasgow and flying from there.

In Dublin itself we have been transported by horse and carriage, trains, buses, our minibus, numerous willing and patient Dublin club members and taxis. Indeed on quite a few tours in the 60's we had our private taxi driver, Brannigan. We are not sure whether he adopted us or we adopted him but he proved an ideal baggage master and certainly knew the width of his vehicle to the nearest centimetre!

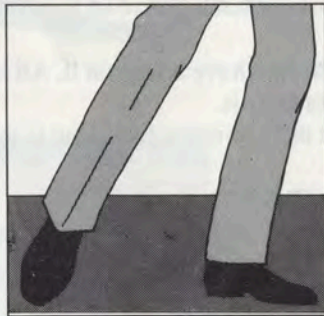
Our statistician has produced some facts and figures from our games with Clontarf - Played 16 (1 in Edinburgh), Won 6, Lost 4, Drawn 5 with one being abandoned.

Not many of the games have been particularly high scoring, the bowlers having the upper hand in most of the encounters. Hughes and Sabino feature regularly as wicket takers for Clontarf with, in 1952, that well known Irishman Raman Subba Row and his Cambridge colleague M. H. Stevenson bowling us out for 76. For Watsonians Douglas Cowan, John Martin, Brian Adair and Stevie Lockhart have been the most prolific wicket takers.

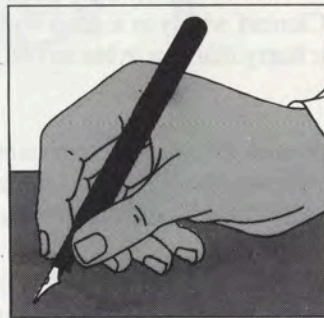
*fig 1.* **Biceps** Open an AIB front door

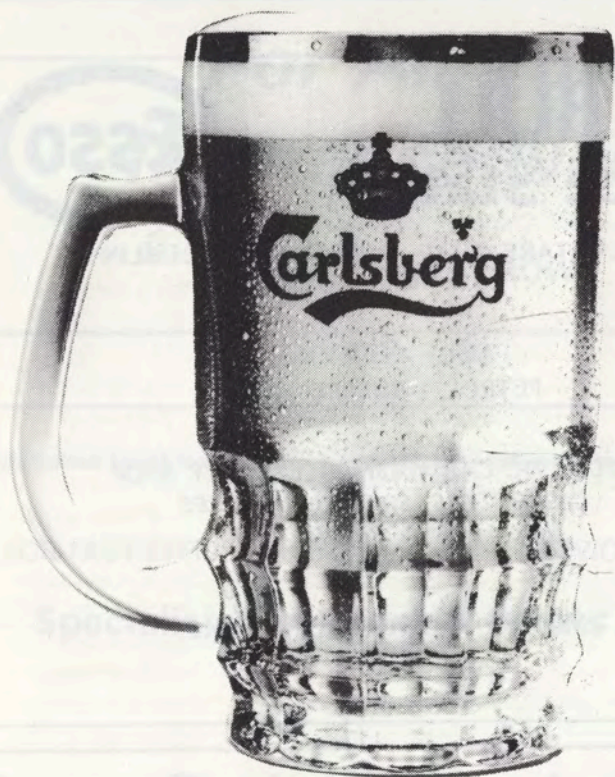
Haste Ye Back.

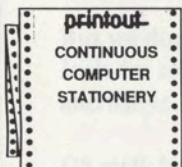

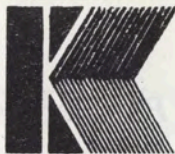

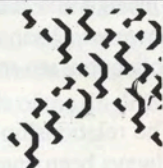

# UP FRONT

## Response to the "Worried" One

In response to an article which appeared in the programme for the Pembroke match on 10 June, where I feel personally attacked, I wish to set out in this article some facts and indeed ask a few questions. I will leave it to you, the members, to make up your minds as to whether talent is coming through. If so, is it being used, encouraged and allowed to serve an apprenticeship to reach expected full potential? Or is it being badly used, stifled, not encouraged, or expected to have the experience of a 30 to 40 year old when they come out of their mother's womb?

When I came to Clontarf C.C. in 1983 the first XI attack consisted of "Podge" Hughes, Rossa Bunworth, Noel Grier and Gerry Kirwan. With not too much in reserve. As I myself had to bowl an over in a cup match, no immediate fifth bowler was on the horizon. Now, due to lack of foresight or planning in the years of the above four without one or two "hopes" the next real cricketers (bat and bowl) were in the under 15 side. At the retirement of Podge and Rossa in 1987, the next prospects were Fitzpatrick, McNeice - both potential quick bowlers - McCready (medium pace) and O' Mahony (left arm spin).

Now these came through the 3rds and were part of a successful XI which won the Senior III Cup two years running. At the start of last season it was decided to play McNeice/Fitzpatrick to open the bowling with McCready and O' Mahony to follow. At this stage also I must add that Grier and Kirwan were also not playing for different reasons. So as you can see we had four potential bowlers under 20. Now one would expect that these four be given a fair chance to serve a reasonable apprenticeship, learning their craft in the middle. However, this was not the case. As soon as Kirwan was available he bowled the bigger percentage of overs, simply from the lack of foresight, faith and encouragement, which again has occurred this season, when in recent matches Delaney has opened the bowling with sides including McCready, McNeice and Barry.

Another statement made in said article was that sound management was running the club well. Can I ask this question, if that is so, how does someone make fixtures for our 1st and 2nd XI on the same day, when with simple foresight it could be seen our resources would be stretched through exams. etc. Through this lack of foresight, both our 1st and 2nd XI are out of the competitions, through having to field very weak teams. If it's not lack of foresight or planning - what?

Foley, I. Synnott, J. Toner, D. Mason, A. Cavanagh, D. Lee, D. Crowley of under 13s fame. But, of course, 10,00 a.m. on Sunday morning is early for some, or perhaps they are not interested - another question no less.
