Congratulations

In December last year when I had the honour of being elected President of Clontarf Cricket Club little did I realise what success lay ahead for 1992. This has been the most successful season for the club since its foundation in 1876.

While we have managed to win either the Senior League or Cup competition at various times this is the first occasion in which we have captured both trophies in the same season. In addition the 2nd X1 were winners of the Senior 2 league and our 4th X1 also won the Intermediate Cup.

The jewel in the crown was, undoubtedly, the never-to-be-forgotten first Saturday in August in the Phoenix Park when we won the cup for the first time in 23 years. The occasion had earlier been enhanced by the visit of Her Excellency, President Mrs Mary Robinson. Perhaps we should invite her more often to toss the coin!

There were many wonderful individual performances during the year. Pride of place must go to Deryck Vincent for that magnificent 161 followed by 5 wickets for 72 against YMCA on cup final day. His consistent heavy scoring combined with those of Michael Rea, Alan McClean and Peter Prendergast, ensured that there was no shortage of runs for the first eleven. Well done to Johnny Daly on retaining the Hopkins Cup for wicket-keeping.

Another batting feat which must be mentioned is that of Dickie Spence who scored 115 not out for the 4th. XI. Dickie has now passed the century mark in the last five decades.

On the bowling front we salute Gerry Kirwan for passing the 1000 wicket mark and who, once again, was the main wicket taker with 49 wickets for the senior side. Well done also to Paul McCready with 54 wickets for the 2nd X1, thereby winning

the Oulton Cup, awarded for the heading the bowling averages in senior 2 cricket.

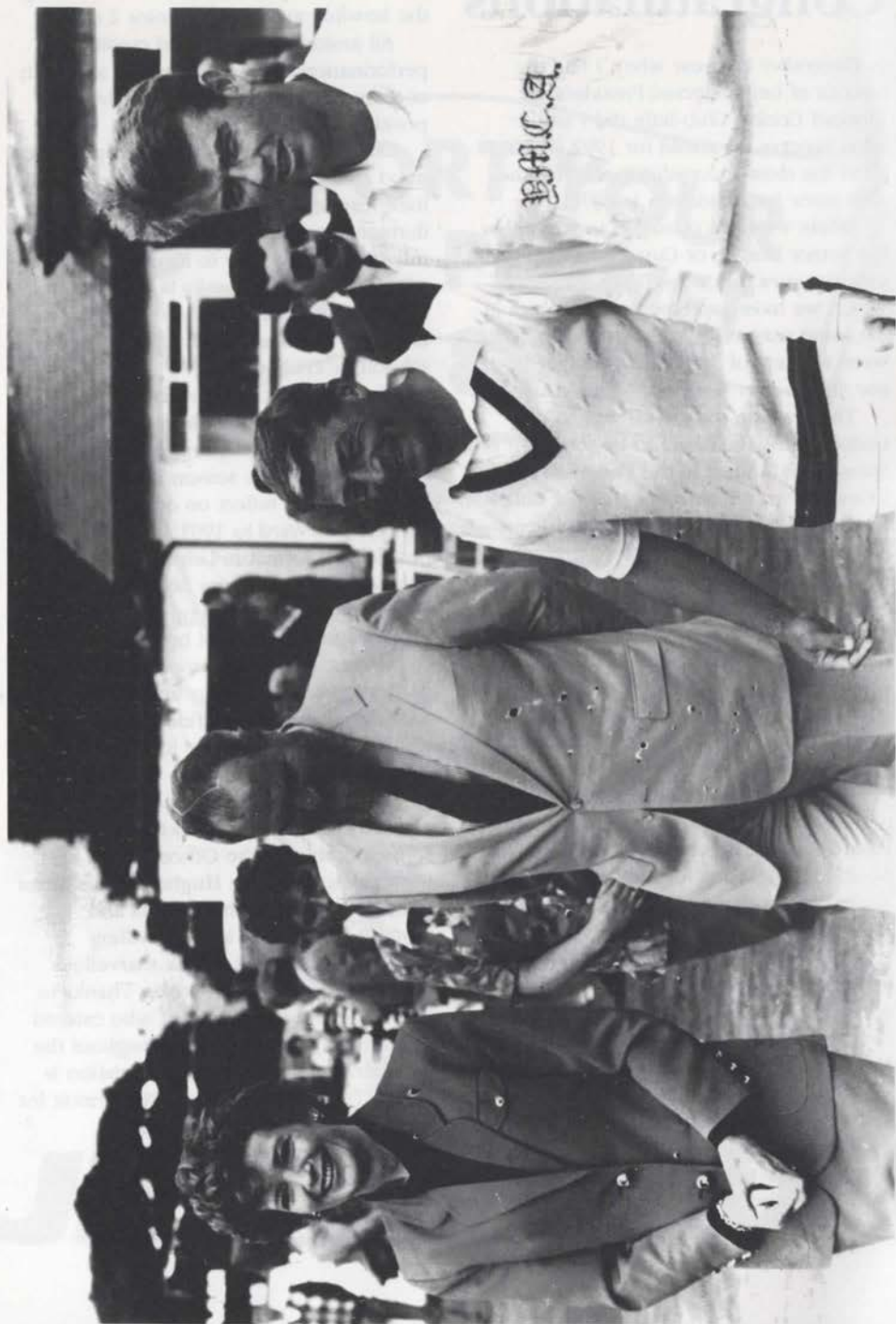
All junior sides provided creditable performances during the season and each of them finished in comfortable league positions.

Our schoolboys continued to produce good results. The under eighteens shared their league and the under fifteens, under thirteens and under elevens reached their respective finals only to lose on each occasion. I wish to express my sincere thanks to all who contributed in making this season so memorable, to the Officers and Committee, to Podge Hughes for his never ending attention to the wickets and ground, Joe Preston and his willing advisers and helpers for the marvellous display of flowers and shrubs. Thanks to Phylis Vincent and her team who catered so admirably for so many throughout the Summer. A final word of appreciation is due to Tom Prior and Enda McDermott for producing this souvenir brochure.

Vincent puts YMCA to sword

Sportsgear Cup Final

Perhaps now Gerry Kirwan can retire happily as he has finally played in a Clontarf cup winning side, the first such success since 1969 and one achieved in some style. Not only did they beat arch rivals YMCA but in doing so they scored a 60-over record total of 338-6 which included a record 161 from their left handed dynamo Deryck Vincent.

This was the highest total ever recorded by a Clontarf player in a senior competition and highest ever scored in the cup final, passing Jack Short's 142 in 1976. In all, he faced 151 balls and hit two sixes and 22 fours.

On winning the toss, Clontarf had no hesitation in batting and the combination of a short boundary, quick outfield and a true batting surface meant that YM were always likely to be chasing a score far in excess of 200.

The chances of containing Clontarf seemed reasonable when Michael Rea was smartly taken by Angus Dunlop at slip in the seventh over. While the dropped chances of the same batsman were now in inconsequential, they proved to be a sign of worse things to come. Between spillages, misfields and overthrows, YM had a day in the field that could charitably be described as 'difficult'.

The early impetus for Clontarf's massive score was provided by Peter Prendergast who hit seven boundaries in his 71 ball 51. The spin of Stuart Taylor was introduced as early as the 11th over, shortly to be joined at the other end by skipper Dunlop. His reasoning was evidently to curb Prendergast's partiality for the quicker bowling. In fact he played more fluently against the slow bowlers than Vincent, who began fretfully.

Dunlop's fourth over saw Vincent inside edge one delivery for four and survive a stumping opportunity off the next. The fact that he swept the next ball for four seemed ominous indeed. Throughout Prendergast chopped Taylor onto his stumps with the score on 91, Vincent and Alan McClean progressed comfortably to a lunchtime score of 125 for two off 31 overs.

There was no need for patient consolidation after the interval as YM served up a generous number of over pitched deliveries. For the final 30 overs Vincent treated the spectators to a spectacular display of attacking batsmanship.

Such a job of demolition can seldom have been executed with such charm and effortless timing. He was justifiably given a standing ovation all the way from wicket to pavilion by players and spectators alike. His departure in the 55th over did not result in any significant deceleration.

YM needed at least two of their four batsmen to make big totals and the positive approach adopted by openers Dunlop and Mark Nulty had the punters calculating required run-rates. Even with the latter's departure just before tea in the 22nd over, there was still a contest with the score on 90-1.

If the Northsiders were gleeful to see the back of Nulty, they indulged in unbridled hysteria when Brian McNeice produced a stunning diving catch in the covers to account for Alan Lewis.

Despite a chanceless 100 from Dunlop, it was not to be. His side battled admirably to the end with Martin Ridgeway reaching his 41 ball 50 in the final over. It was Clontarf's fielding that made the difference and they thoroughly deserved their victory. As if his choice as man of the match was in any doubt, Vincent also had the temerity to pick up five wickets.

What a day!

The insistent ringing of the alarm clock eventually penetrated the brain - far too early for a Saturday! Gradually the realisation dawned that the "big day" was finally here. The consistent chatter, songs and cheerful quips were missing, while replies to greetings were almost monosyllabic. The dreaded pre-match nerves had hit in a big way.

We reached the park in the misty, early morning to find Phoenix humming with activity. The clubhouse looked wonderful and the wicket was pronounced the best seen in Phoenix for years. As these comments were made to Phoenix members a glow of pleasure suffused their faces. After months of hard work it is very rewarding to have all the time and effort appreciated. The amount of time and effort on this occasion must have been huge as the whole scene was a credit to our hosts.

We were the first of the participants in the day's events to arrive, followed closely by the remainder of the Clontarf team and entourage. This was a source of amazement for our opposition when they arrived to find Clontarf already installed and "raring to go". To soothe frayed nerves, a distracted flicking through the match programme was a necessity. Silence descended as gradually everyone's individual attention was given to the Clontarf player profiles. Congratulations, and thanks, to Peter Prendergast for his wit and insight. A good laugh was exactly what everyone needed to release the tension that was steadily building up in all of us.

The warm-up began quietly enough with our lads wandering out, resplendent in their new team sweatshirts, each embarking on their own individual routine. The southside warm-up, conducted in front of the pavilion, was a rather energetic game of touch rugby. The threat of impending rain did nothing to distract the intense concentration of the pre-match preparations. Then, back to the pavilion to change into "whites" and prepare for the arrival of the guest of honour. Sitting around waiting for the arrival of the president and the ensuing photographs was surely not ideal match preparation but nobody complained. The teams sat in groups, chatting quietly, trying to maintain composure, when suddenly a buzz of excitement travelled around the ground, heralding the arrival of Mary Robinson.

There followed hundreds of photographs as the teams and officials lined up for introductions. With the toss taken and the final eager amateur photographer ushered off the field, the scene was set for the contest to begin in earnest. We had won the toss, were batting, and as I headed for the scoreboard, I crossed my fingers that this was to be a good omen.

Most of the Clontarf innings is a blur in my memory as we were hard-pressed to keep up with the pace of the scoring. I remember a sick feeling in the pit of my stomach when Michael Rea was out early - not another cup final collapse... please. Peter, on his way to a half-century, was looking assured and comfortable at the other end when he was joined by Deryck. Vinno's innings was superb - no words can describe it and the emotional scenes, when he was out, were a fitting tribute. If ever a player deserved a standing ovation, he did. At the end of the innings, many photographs were taken of the historic scoreboard and the Clontarf supporters were jubilant.

When time came for tea, the realisation was dawning that the dream was becoming a reality. To wound up to sit in the tea-room, and longing to savour the atmosphere after the isolation of the scoreboard, I wandered to the hospitality tent for a chat. Here, the general consensus was that to all intents and purposes, the game was over.

Once again, my memory of the Y.M. innings is hazy, but the event that will remain in everyone's mind must surely be Brian McNeice's brilliant catch to dismiss Alan Lewis. Images flit across my brain of fleet-footed fielders and joyous faces as able hands took every catch that came their way. The icing on the cake was Deryck's five wicket haul - a fitting end to his momentous day.

The presentation of trophies was a muted affair - Clontarf people exhausted by the elation of the day, the Sandymount crowd stunned into silence. For Enda, the cup presentation must have been a proud and emotional moment - the weight of silver banishing memories of past disappointments. He seemed almost at a loss for words and who can blame him? The time for celebration had arrived and who better to enjoy it than a club robbed of cup celebrations for so many years! Well done lads and thank you.
