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



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The Demize of the lovely game

The great priest, Thomas William Croke, Archbishop of Cashel, was the man who most inspired the founding of the Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA) (Thurles 1884). He was determined that the neglected games of hurling, handball and gaelic football would be revived, and even the most casual observation would indicate that he and his fellow visionaries have succeeded in the most extraordinary way. His fears for our native games were well founded. Contemporary accounts of the social, political and economic life of the country in the latter half of the 19th century trace the emergence of a significant number of small, independent landowners, gathering prosperity, increased leisure time and a fondness for sport and diversion of all kinds. The garrison sports (cricket, hockey, rugby and soccer) were continuing to develop outside the military/gentry axis and, with all forms of athletics popular everywhere (hence the 'athletic' in GAA), were becoming a threat to our native games. Cricket was played extensively by all who had access to leisure and not just the denizens of the 'Big House' and the officer element of His Majesty's soldiery. There are indications, given a number of clubs and players, that, but for the founding of the GAA, cricket might have developed as an important summer game. I accept that it is massively over simplistic to fast forward the game and the social milieu a hundred years without careful and critical analysis but the sad reality is that one of the loveliest of games paddles in the backwaters and has few friends outside a coterie of obsessives who for signs, symbols and abstruseness of language may as well belong to a secret society. As one who, by force of circumstances, had to step away from this great game and has shed some of the consequent baggage, it is tempting to explain the demise (and the ever continuing demise to extinction) to circumstances outside our control but this simply dangerous waffle and obscures the fact that, while there are many reasons why cricket is of no importance in modern Ireland, we have, at first, to look closely at the guardians of the game, is failing the game and will continue to fail the game until it has as much relevance to the real world as road bowls, that arcane and specialised past time that adorns the twisting side roads of West Cork on summer Sunday mornings.

Except for parts of the North West, cricket has remained determinedly middle class and manifests itself in the qualities and weaknesses of that mode of thinking. Qualities that come to mind are the need, rarely stated, to be the indispensable servants of the risk taking minority, discipline, focus, integrity, intense conservatism and a strong wish for consensus. These are admirable traits, and seen to great advantage in our own club, which produce very fine administrators but which are utterly at odds with the idea of risk and unable to countenance a real world that is changing, ever adapting, always creative, amenable to tradition and very impatient of those choosing to live in the past. Cricket minds reside in a philosophy that sees the canal system as high tech, choosing not to see that the game is innately organic, demands change and can only prosper when it meets the demands of each particular time. Cricket has adapted painfully to change in other countries but has fossilised beyond recognition in this country. We have a national team that contains some of the youngest geriatrics in the world and an attitude that implies that simply turning up is sufficient. Enough is not enough, was never enough and will never be enough and that these men are awarded caps out of number, the greatest honour that any cricketer can aspire to, has begun to devalue the honour and put it on par for worthlessness with a Turkish lira

note.

The ICU will point to developments over the years and it is well to consider them. The Guinness Cup was introduced in the mid 60s and the All Ireland cup some 15 years later - both competitions are very worthwhile. The annual match with Scotland remains our only serious fixture while courtships with Wales, Denmark and Holland have gone the way of most courtships. We have entered the Nat. West and B & H. competitions because we get well paid to do so but as a cricketing exercise we may as well build a succession of follies. We entertain touring sides (test), field first, bat second which drives most of us into the sanctuary of the bar to spend money we don't have on alcohol we don't need to cushion the pain of watching an exercise that is both pointless and irrelevant. Our most recent stated aim is to be competitive at ICC level. This is a very laudable and worthwhile aspiration and well reflected in a better balanced fixture list for 1996.

In an article like this where the writer is free to criticise, it would be both irresponsible and dishonest and not to suggest ways in which the terminal state of the game could not be halted and it's fortunes revived. Just off the top of my head and capable of being added to considerably.

(1) That consistent with it's main aim of developing and fostering the game the ICU shall have as it's main priority the creation of a successful national team.

(2) That senior professional appointments be made to run the game on a business like basis. These appointees to come from the private sector or possibly the more independent semi state sector. All appointees to have significant managerial/marketing experience.

(3) The money to fund this to be found within the private sector - if possible (Lottery and government funding to be considered when the private sector has been trawled) - and that the partnership between the ICU and it's main sponsor have clearly stated and achievable aspirations, a time frame to achieve these and, barring some major catastrophe, a stated recognition that the partnership is here for the long haul.

(4) The ICU to consider paying it's national team

(5) Coaching to be made more wide spread and an administrative function to be enlisted to underpin this. The ICU to look carefully at the IRFU set up and particularly the schemes carried out by the various boards (county) of the GAA.

(6) The ICU to cease playing English counties except to play in the NAT WEST.

(7) That consideration be given to according national status to two (2) club grounds and that this arrangement hold for a minimum of five (5) years.

(8) That the ICU commission a suitable anthem

(9) That the ICU state a date (say, 1/1/2001) for realising part one (1) of it's national aspiration, i.e., that we achieve a playing standard within the ICC that enables us to pass to the only aspiration that is worth considering.

(10) That the ICU set a date (say, 1/1/2006) when Ireland will formally apply to be admitted as a test playing nation.

The committees of the ICU can decide to preside over the death of Irish cricket or enter into an awkward, uncomfortable world where the only certainties are uncertainties. The lure of the safety net is all pervasive but the rewards of the latter is an opening to endless possibilities.



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
The Scorer's Lament



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


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Past Times
