Thoughts of Brian O'Sullivan Schoolboy Co-ordinator

When Tom Prior asked me to take responsibility for the Schoolboy Section some four years ago I had no idea how big the job actually would turn out to be or indeed how to set about doing it. Obviously there were a number of teams playing competitive matches and a larger number of younger boys operating on Friday nights. Over the previous number of years I could not understand how

the large contingent on Friday nights seemed to be decreasing rapidly as they became 11, 13, 15, etc resulting in there being hardly enough boys for the Under 15s and an Under 18 team which usually had to be filled by the better Under 15s.

At the same time the decline in the number of adult members was giving grave cause for concern for the future of the club. The average age of the Executive Committee was rising as each year went by - making it harder for the younger members who wished to be actively involved in the Club's future to take the step of standing for Committee as they felt they would not have much in common with their elder brethren.

It was felt that the chances of finding sufficient new adult members to guarantee the Club's future were small so the only way forward was to try and develop new members from the Schoolboy Section. In order that the trend of membership falling off as the boys grew older be halted we decided to see if involving more of the boys in competitive matches would make a difference. We had realised that some of the boys has started at the age of seven and up to the time they decided to give up cricket at maybe 11 or 12 had never played in a competitive match and had to wear proper cricket gear.

We resolved to enter a second Under 11 team in the League. While the results were not great another dozen or so boys were playing matches and enjoying it. It was noticeable the following year that there was more interest shown and when the boys had spent two years playing in Competitions. Two further years later in 1999 we entered two Under 15 teams in the Leinster League for the first time.

In 1999 over one hundred boys played competitively for Clontarf at Under 9, Under 11, Under 13, Under 15, Under 17 and Under 19 Levels. This a tribute to a dedicated group of members who over the past four years have helped with the Friday night throngs, have coached, trained and managed teams and to parents who have been supportive of both their sons and the Club.

It will take a few more years for the Under 11s of 1994 to be inducted into the adult ranks where we would hope to have players for all the adult teams and not just the Firsts and Seconds. I hope that these young adults realise that Clontarf is their Club (not the old fogies running it now - many of whom would relieve to have their burden eased) and it is up to them how it will develop in the future.

A great deal of progress has been made in the past four years. However the more successful the strategy has become the more resources are required to keep it going. The situation for 2000 is that even more helpers are going to be required.

- We need a minimum of 16 'Coaches' for Friday nights.
- We need Managers for all Schoolboy teams (we had eight teams in 1999). We will have at least seven in 2000.
- For the two Under 15 teams we need Managers who are available during the day.
- For the Under 11 and Under 13 teams we need Managers available on Saturday or Sunday mornings.

These requirements are additional to a coach and hopefully an assistant who will look after day to day coaching of the Under 13's upward.

Editor Comment: Clontarf Cricket Club owe a great debt to the sterling efforts of Brian in managing the Schoolboy Section with a great deal of professionalism, care and fairness for all the boys - Thanks Brian

ALL-IRELAND CUP

This competition, which was inaugurated in 1982 involves clubs in the Leinster Cricket Union, Munster Cricket Union, Ulster Cricket Union and the North West Cricket Union.

Initially, matches which could not be completed due to weather, were decided on a bowl-out. Clontarf were involved in three such deciders, winning one and losing two, all in Castle Avenue. Currently, weather affected matches are re-fixed to the ground of the visiting team in the initial match.

To date, Clontarf have played 32 matches in this competition, winning 15 and losing 17. The final was reached in 1990 when we were defeated by Lurgan by 73 runs. In 1998 we lost the semi-final by two runs to Ballymena.

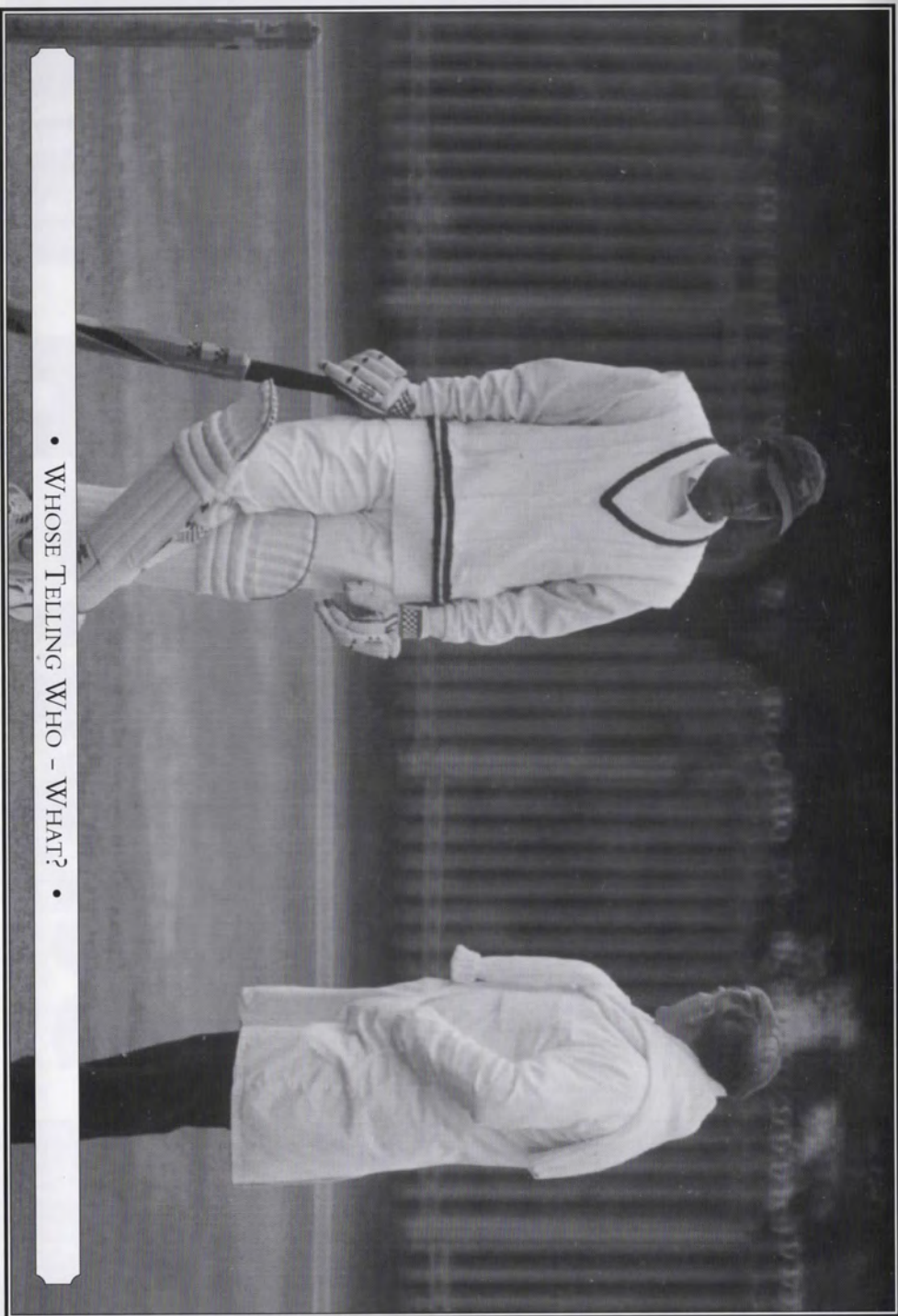

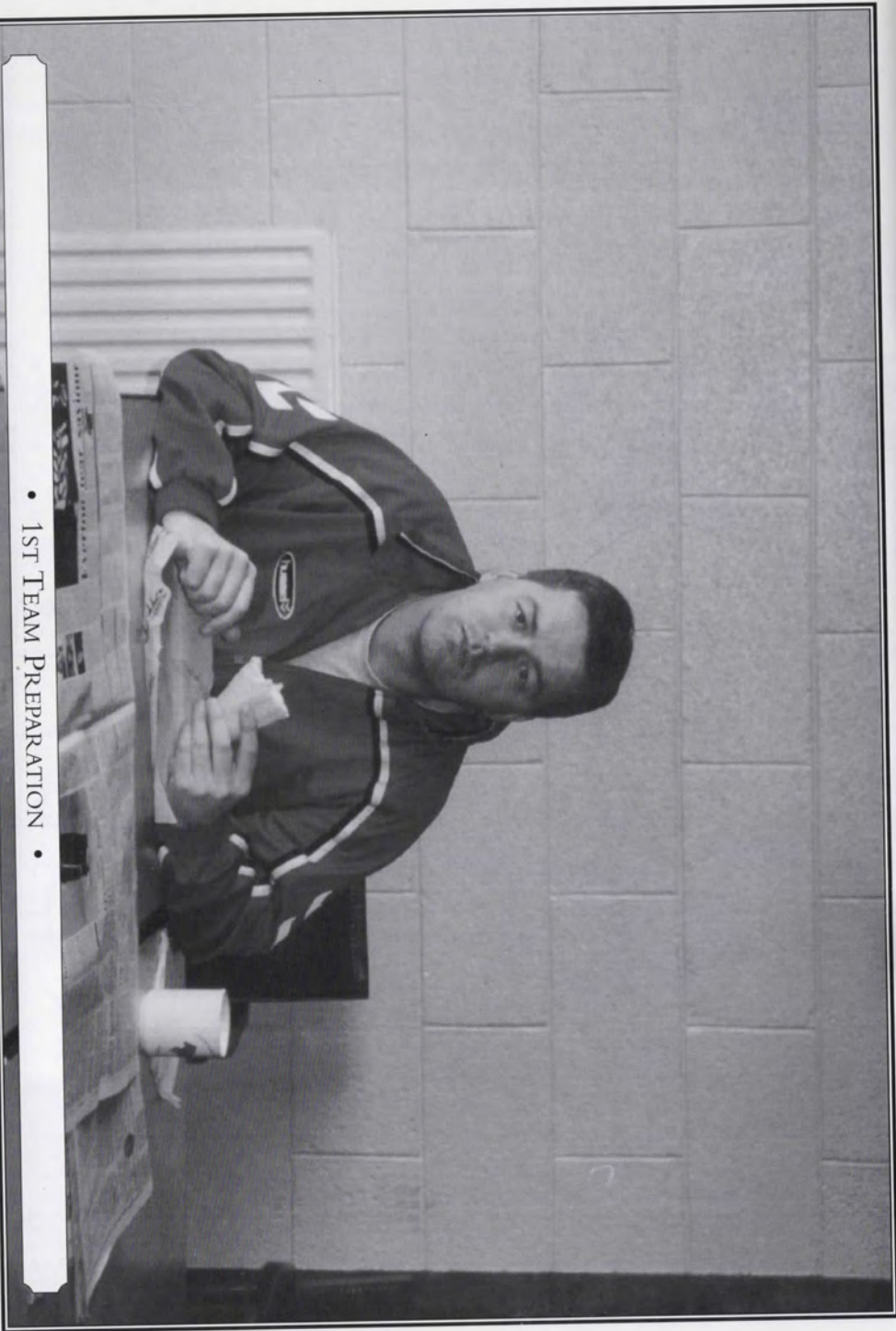



Days in the Sun at Castle Avenue

My good friend Frank Keating of THE GUARDIAN once wrote memorably about what he termed "the great cathedrals" of the religion that is rugby - Lansdowne Road, Twickenham, the Arms Park, Eden Park in Auckland, Loftus Versfeld in Pretoria. The crowds, the epic matches, the agony of defeat, the ecstasy that is victory - all combine to live on in the memories of Keating's worshippers at these great sporting arenas.

Now, I'm sure that not even Clontarf Cricket Club's president, genial Fergus Carroll, would describe Castle Avenue as a "cathedral". Still, nobody would deny that it has an unique atmosphere all its own; Castle Avenue is one of my favourite cricket grounds, and, now that yet another season is winding down, I will miss my visits there, during the bleak days of winter.

To record details of the many great contests which have been played at Castle Avenue would involve writing something as long as Book one of War and Peace. But the undefeated double century and century scored by Mark Waugh for MCC against Ireland, when he was a young professional at Lord's, lives in the memory, and so does an incident in the bar on one evening during the match, when the young Aussie and the kid from New Zealand who was the team's 12th man learned that Clontarf is also home of a rugby club.

The pair were accosted by a well-known 'Tarf rugby man, who told them, in colourful phrases, about the many Australians ("like you two", the 'Tarf man told them) who were rushing headlong to Ireland and who would be lining out on the 1st XV the next season. The New Zealand kid was less than delira to have his national identity mistaken - "but I'm not an Aussie - I'm a Kiwi!", he protested.

"Sure that doesn't matter!", retorted the rugby guru. "The way you speak, you all sound the f.....g same to me!" There's an example of sporting ecumenism for you.

Apart from its prowess on the field of play down the years at all levels - and congratulations are in order for skipper Robert Hedigan and his Under 13 team on their recent unique treble - Clontarf's excellent match programmes are an example which could usefully be followed by some I could mention in high places, but won't.



I recall one such production, many years ago, which contained a piece penned by my good friend Fergal Tobin, in which he described the upcoming match as seen through the eyes of several prominent journalists and writers, among them my colleague Ned Van Esbeck, late of The Irish Times, known to his mates as "Van Halfback" or "Van Outside Halfback", the latter



term, in his view, being the more technically correct description for the number 10 position on a rugby team.

Fergal's piece extolled, at some length, the joys and the traditions of the summer game, looked forward to the time when the annals of Irish cricket would be recorded on stown tablets, taken down from the mountain. And his Van Esbeck send-up concluded -"but I will say again, and make no apology for saying it, over and over, that it is simply nothing short of a disgrace that a place for Tony Ward could not be found in either team". At the time, the Ward-Ollie Campbell saga, recounted at length by Ned, was at its zenith.

I still recall the first time that I called to the Tobin Chateau, in far-flung Killester. I was waiting for Fergal in his room when Catherine, his better half, who I hadn't met before, came in with a cup of coffee for me, to discover me idly swinging the cricket bat which had been leaning against the wall.

"Christ!", she said. "Not another one!"

I'm lucky that Castle Avenue is easily accessible from the family mansion on the azure Cote de Baldoyle, by car or on the DART. On occasions, in my less mature days, I have even cycled to the ground, only to find that getting there is one thing, while the return journey can be, well, let's say hazardous, for reasons which escape me. Maybe it's something to do with the balmy night air.

Castle Avenue was truly en fete for the World Cup match last May, a credit to the hard working ladies and gentlemen of the host club. Undoubtedly, that was the biggest match ever staged there; but you don't have to have a major occasion to enjoy yourself at Clontarf - it's enough to savour good company, watch the match, no matter who is playing, and dally over a few jars afterwards.

Now, it's that time of year that cricketers and cricket lovers dread, when autumn steadily approaches, the days draw in and yet another season winds inexorably down. Next April seems like an eternity away; but we can all console ourselves between now and then in the dark days of winter with the memories of the good company we shared, of the catches, the runs, the thrills and the spills, during the summer time, when together we watched "the run-stealers flicker to and fro, to and fro", in the pleasant ambience that is Castle Avenue.

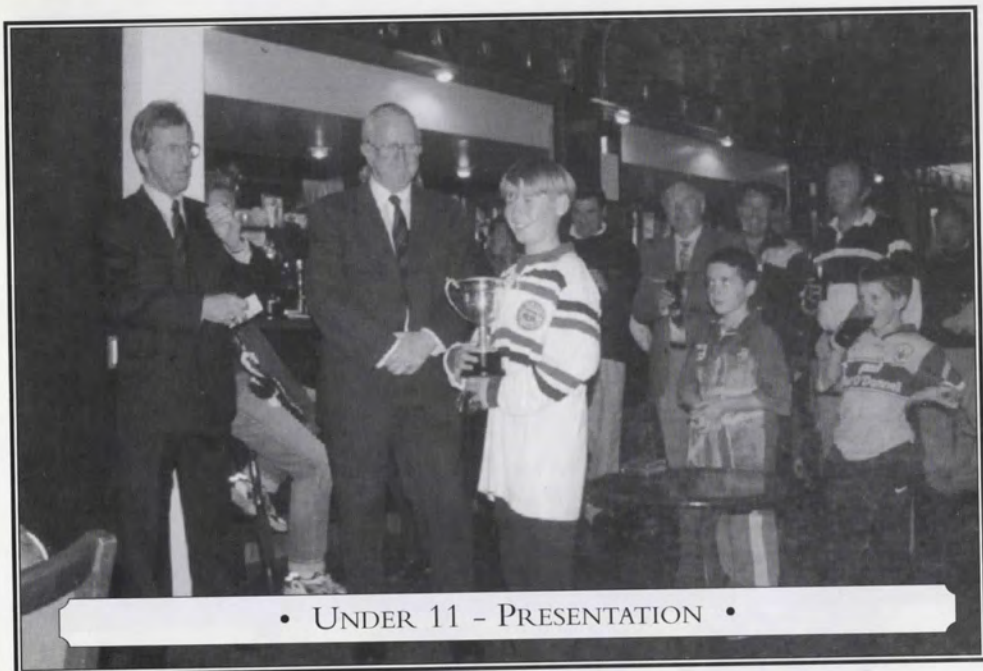
