Enjoy the Summer.

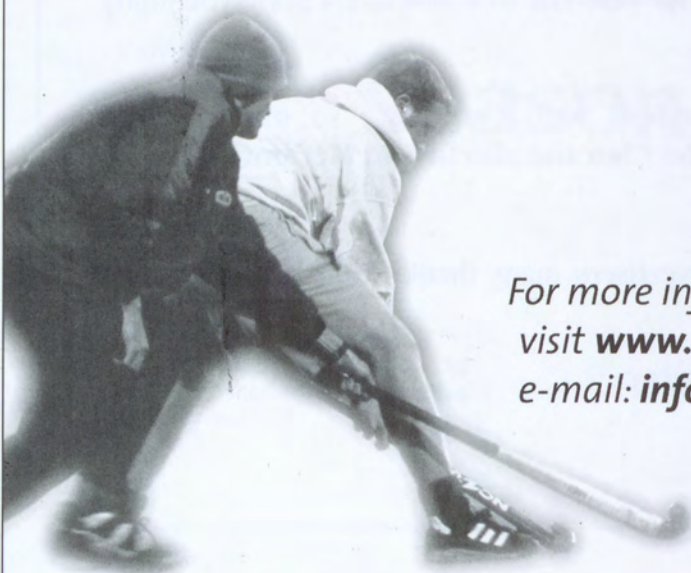

## THE TAVERNERS

*There has always been a taverners team of sorts at Clontarf. A game here a game there, amongst old friends who still wanted to keep a bit of the magic alive. But they were often far and few between with little consistency of players. In the early nineties though, John 'little ol' winedrinker me' Lyon, kickstarted an idea that went on for quite a few years and is still around in one form or another. **Tony Hunt** remembers...*

# It's just not cricket...

## 10 years on the road

Since he joined the club in the early '80s John Lyon came up with many schemes to keep the funds rolling in for the schoolboys etc. Quizzes, raffles and then a Taverners team for what were essentially beginners. "I can get the wicket for a Wednesday, £2 a game and we all stay after for a drink and a game of darts." That puts at least 22 in the bar on a Wednesday when it's usually empty, which also equals bar receipts up and why not have a raffle with that. "Would you like to join?", "I don't play cricket", "Oh, that doesn't matter, you'll soon pick it up". And pick it up we all did.

We played 9-10 games that first year with a team that included Mick Ryan, Paddy O'Reilly and Johnnie MacDonald.

After that first season, feeling rather cocky, a tour was suggested which soon became fact. John was to bring us to Lancashire to play a few matches. It was to be Southport where 'tarf had toured before so, the ground had been lain. This was the start of the Mick the Book tradition. Weekly amounts were filtered to Mick Toner who organised a bank account and ledger.

Of that first touring team only half had played before but by the end of it we'd all be seasoned Taverners. We had sponsorship and even a coach to drive to all the fixtures.

We got quite a shock with our first game, the Formby side took the game serious! A younger team than expected turned out, which included a junior Australian international. There was to be no Taverners rules it was to be a one day game of 50 overs. Did someone get their wires crossed when arranging this fixture? But we had a strong captain in Brendan Moylan who was picked not just for his celebrated after dinner speeches but for... well to be honest, he was the only one

anyway articulate when it came to after match speeches.

Still, he mustered the troops and surprised us all with his knowledge of field positions, his pep talks and advice on fashion. You can't go wrong with a Pringle!

**Advice from John:** Get your head over the ball and hands down...duh? Wait for it to come to you and if it's short you should be able to thump it. Thump it we did, for we knew no real strokes but inspired by Johns example our batting side gave a good account for ourselves. Even Cecil Dixon, forever our mentor -with his little snippets of wisdom over his vodka and soda - commended us

for a great show of audaciousness. When told that we wanted Smithy to play for us really badly he replied "... he didn't disappoint then did he."

One hero of the day was Robby Beshoff, never a prolific scorer at home, in fact, never a scorer. He took his time walking out to bat, as that was usually the most time he'd spend on the field during an innings. He survived an onslaught from the Australian with strokes that denied belief and came off to tumultuous applause with a credible 23.

Some of us were asked to umpire for the first time during this tour, "Jesus John, what do I do? Do I have to run after the ball?" "No mate, after the match."

To tell the truth, cricket wise, no tour has touched the first, oh, we get our game in (mostly) but nothing ever to the level we reached in 1995. I remember reaching 45 at St. Helens, I still don't remember how, as I was terrified of every ball. The sweat poured off me as we played against

some of John Lyons old team mates. After the game he told us how proud he was of the way we all upped our game. After that we were determined to tour every year.

It's been 10 years now and we've travelled twice to Galway, Kilkenny, Cork and Kinsale. Over the water to the Isle of Man and this year to Amsterdam.

There are plenty of stories from all the tours, the majority of which will only be talked amongst ourselves. Here follows a few memorable moments though...

Once in Galway a certain Mr Brophy had an accident when someone moved the bar he was leaning against. To tell the truth we were really worried for him as he was hospitalised after the fall. He pulled through okay and joined us the following year in Kilkenny. Taking no chances we presented him with crash helmet which had a gauge on the front to let his companions know if he was veering to the right or left.



In the Isle of Man we discovered a certain member had a problem with sleepwalking, and would wander around other peoples rooms in the early hours of the morning, many an old dear came down to breakfast with a smile on her face after discovering a nubile young man sleeping next to her. Wandering problems of another sort happened to Mick Toner who, after an evening of after hours indulgence at the Victoria's bar in Galway was found wandering around Eyre square in the company of a certain dubious looking character called Timmy. "He seemed like a nice fellow", said Toner later, "we were drinking with him all night. He thought I needed a bit of fresh air. I think he said we were going to his house". Needless to say the said Timmy did a runner on the appearance of Tony Hunt, who on returning to the hotel (at 7am?) had noticed an out of sorts Mick being led towards the park by a complete stranger.

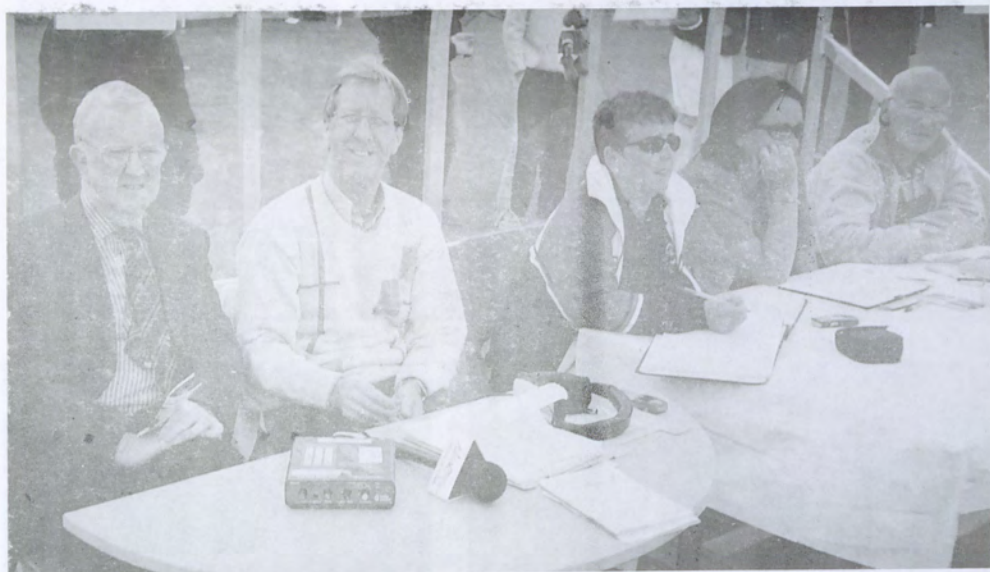

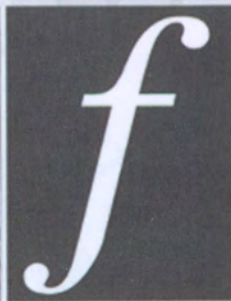

## GROUNDS and CLUBHOUSES

YMCA have a new clubhouse and what a wonderful thing it is. It has been a long time coming but now the Claremount Road ground is replete with a new scoreboard, a gym, lots of pine decking and a bounding 21st century enthusiasm but the set up is a lot better than how it used to be. On seeing the ground develop from its early stages to its fruition I was provoked to thinking about other grounds that have had facelifts. I thought about how Clontarf CC used to be in the early 80's with its rusty nets and white picket fence. I thought about the old clubhouse in Leinster CC. I recalled the Man-O-War ground, Pembroke, Railway Union and so on. Ultimately I recalled, with fondness and some sadness the inexhaustible adventure of these places that are now, in the words of Yeats, 'changed utterly'.

In 1984 the West Indies, at the height of their pomp, played in Rathmines. I was taken to the game by my father and spent hours, not watching cricket, but exploring the environs. Being eleven years old at the time, the idea of observing cricket (despite the fact that it was the great West Indies) as opposed to participating seemed like school; Indeed, upon reflection, I am sure my father's reason for bringing me to the match was more to do with broadening my cricketing horizons than giving my mother a few hours peace (the trials of having a parent who could quote vast chunks of *Wisden* - I guess there are worse things in life?) Still I can remember that day vividly for two reasons, one was that I met Joel Garner and was terrified and secondly I discovered at the back of the pavilion countless empty bottles that I took great pleasure in smashing. The Windies won the match, Alan Lewis, on his debut, got a duck and all things being equal I had a great day.

There were days like this in Clontarf CC too. The visit of Sussex in, on the early 80's some time, the West Indies in 1980, the South Africans in 1998 together with the drunken chorus led by Paul Ryan and Paddy Lee singing 'Alan Donald had a farm', the humiliation of Middlesex, the World Cup, the great 5th XI quarter final (over two legs) against Leinster in 1996, the list goes on. What the recollection of these times should do, but in writing this article I wonder do they? is remind us cricketing folk of the great thing that a cricket ground is. Is Clontarf CC a place? Does it exist in its members or in its pitch and clubhouse? Does it exist in the sound of bit on



ball or in the memories it evokes? I would say it exists in all these things and that is something that ought never be taken for granted. When I migrated to YMCA two years ago I did not cease my relationship with Clontarf CC. In some ways my relationship with Clontarf CC is deeper and more meaningful now that I don't play there anymore because, for me, the place exists in the memory of stumptests, rounders on the pitch on endless summer evenings, the disco on Saturday nights and John Lyon calling us 'flamin' apes'.

Everything eventually belongs to the past and in time Clontarf CC will change again. Those of you reading this who belong to a different vintage than I do will have your own memories, your own thoughts upon change and will no doubt experience the bittersweet wistfulness of days gone by tugging at you like a small child wanting attention. Yet cricket in its fundamental form does not change and although the surface of Clontarf CC, YMCA, Leinster et al is not the same as it was the beating heart beneath this exterior still pumps its goodwill, its sense of community, its triumphs and disasters into those who are receptive to it.

The next time you are strolling around the ground at Castle Avenue or Claremont Road or standing at mid-wicket wondering if the game you are playing in will finish before the sun goes down take a look at the clubhouse, the earth you are standing on and be grateful for its existence. Be grateful for what it has given you and especially the fact that it has asked nothing in return of you. If you are a Clontarf CC member spare a thought for us poor souls out in YMCA, at least you have a bar and that alone is worth some consideration.
