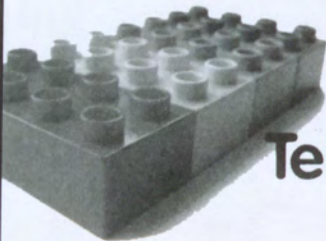
Ladies 2nd XI with the Mirror Cup, the team also won the division 3 title

Seventh Heaven!

Clontarf Cricket Club has a long history of successful "Junior" teams. The teams (4ths, 5ths and 6ths) have traditionally been the breeding ground for young players on their way up the ranks. As far back as 1956, the 4th XI won the Junior Cup with future stars of the firsts, Fergus Carroll, Roy Buckley and Podge Hughes playing.

The growth of Junior Cricket in the 1970s meant the introduction of the 6th XI for the first time in 1977. The captaincy of the 6ths alternated between Donal O'Sullivan and Dermot Gunn during a 20-year period until the numbers dwindled and the 6ths folded in 1997. The highlight of the reign was the League and Cup double win in 1990 when the team had among its players future club captain Iain Synnott.

With the exploits of the Irish team in the West Indies in 2007, there was a huge influx of new members wanting to play cricket. The 5th XI had far more players than was required. Credit must go to Paul "WG" Grace and Paul McShane who spent the summer arranging friendlies to keep everyone interested. At the end of the 2008 season it was felt by some the Junior players that a 6th XI was required. While there was some apprehension as to whether or not there would be sufficient numbers to fill a 6th XI, with the support of Iain Synnott, Stella Downes and Deryck Vincent a 6th XI team was entered in the LCU Junior C League with Tom James installed as captain.

Much like the previous 6th XI, in 2009 the 6ths played their home games in Mount Temple. With a team that was made of many first time cricketers supplemented by youth players, the first season was a success. While the team didn't set the world on fire with their results, they finished

a respectable mid-table and gave an exposure to cricket to over 30 players. Debuts were given to youth players such as Mark Collier, Conor Mullins and Rory Kirk who are now plying their trade for the higher teams, with Mark regularly turning out for the 2nds this year.

In 2010 the numbers grew again. Much like 2007, there were a lot of friendlies arranged to try and keep everyone involved. The 6ths continued to give a first experience of men's cricket to the players of tomorrow, with 12-year old Andrew and David Delany becoming regular members of the team. But for two narrow defeats in July, the 6ths would have been very close to winning the league, eventually finishing 3rd after a run of games unbeaten to the end of the season. Once again, over 30 players turned out for the 6ths during the season.

The 6ths had reached breaking point in terms of numbers and for the second time in three years another team was required. In a historic venture for the club, a 7th XI was entered in the new LCU Division 14 and the Minor Cup for the 2011 season. The captain (Daniel Nolan) and vice-captain (John Watson) had never played league cricket before joining the 6ths in 2009. With Ireland's performance in the World Cup yet again a huge influx of numbers again appeared at Wednesday night training. The 7th XI took to the field for the

first time ever in the club's history in Castle Avenue on Easter Sunday in a game against Knockharley.

At the time of writing the 5ths and 6ths are right up the top of their respective leagues. The marked improvement in the performance of the teams is down to the investment the club has put into coaching. Last season the Wednesday nights sessions were overseen by the great Deryck Vincent and Irish international Andrew Poynter. This year coaching is being looked after by first team players Adrian D'Arcy and Richard Forrest. The feedback from the players has been very positive,

with the two lads having the knack of knowing how to tailor their coaching to the individual needs of each player. With the improvement in the performance of players, we would be very hopeful that the Junior teams would bring home some silverware this season.

With over 20 players having already turned out for the 7ths in their first four games and the increase in numbers at under 11 and under 13 that will be requiring exposure to men's cricket in the coming seasons, we might well see the need for an 8th XI in the future. The growth of Junior Cricket in Clontarf Cricket Club goes on and on....

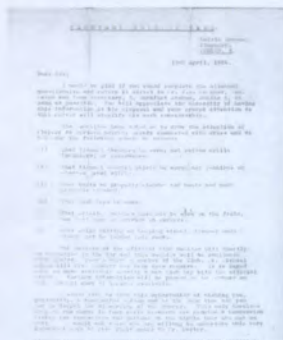
Ah! The good old days

Recently the papers relating to Clontarf Cricket Club which had been the property of a deceased member and accumulated over a number of years were donated to the club. A letter dated 1964 from the Hon. Secretary to the members was among the treasures therein. It is very revealing of the difference between manners then and now.

Remember that at this time 50 overs cricket had only just been introduced and 20/20 and coloured clothing was unheard of. The first Cricket World Cup was still 11 years away. Computers did exist but Personal Computers and e-mail were still many years into the distant future, so the letter was typed out on a typewriter and the original then photocopied. The copy was then folded, again by hand, and then placed in an envelope and mailed, or hand delivered, to the members. Notice also the size of the paper was not the PC imposed standard A4 of today but what was then called Crown Quarto, 10 x 8 inches, even then the name was quaint.

The purpose of the letter itself was primarily to remind players about their sartorial appearance on the field of play. There must have been a drop in the dress values within the club with some members wearing gabardeen or white painter's trousers, others, or possibly the same culprits, wearing T-shirts or short sleeved shirts. That was to be ruthlessly stamped out. Tucking your trouser ends into your stockings whilst batting or keeping wicket was to be completely banned and wearing a watch was definitely not an option. Club caps were available but without the club crest and were intended to be worn, not carried in your pocket.

The original letter



The younger members, nowadays kitted out in the finest equipment from a host of suppliers would not appreciate what it was like for a cricketer at that time. Leather boots were the only ones available, batting pads were made of canvas and both had to be cleaned and whitened in preparation for the next match. There was no such thing as club logos on shirts or trousers that you could get from the club shop, and when you needed new gear you bussed to the city—very few cars then—to the one shop that I can recall that sold cricket gear at the time, Elverys.

For those members who are now heading for our sixties and beyond, the letter and the times will be fondly remembered and it is good to report that the Mr. Dexter mentioned is still with us and still active in the affairs of the club, long may he continue.

The contents of the letter itself are reproduced overleaf.

I would be glad if you would complete the attached questionnaire and return it direct to Mr. J.A. McManus, Hon. Match and Team Secretary, 5, Ennafort Avenue, Dublin 5, as soon as possible. You will appreciate the necessity of having this information at his disposal and your prompt attention to this matter will simplify his work considerably.

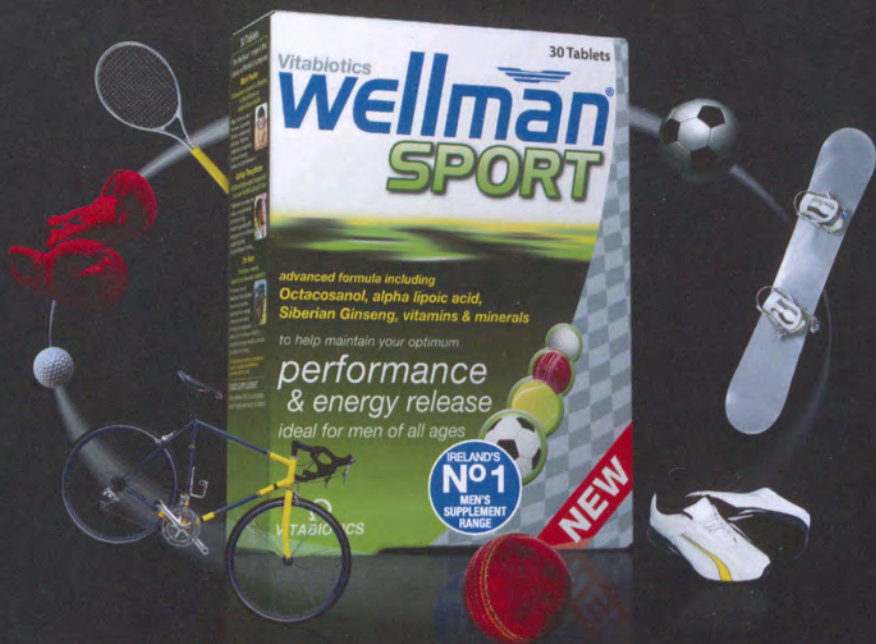
The Committee have asked me to draw the attention of Players to certain points, mainly connected with dress and to this end the following should be noted:-

- (1) That flannel trousers be worn; not cotton drills (painters) or gaberdeens.
- (2) That flannel cricket shirts be worn; not T-shirts or short-sleeved shirts.
- (3) That boots be properly studded and boots and pads properly cleaned.
- (4) That Club Caps be worn.
- (5) That wristlet watches must not be worn on the field, nor must caps be carried in pockets,
- (6) That while batting or keeping wicket, trouser ends should not be folded into socks.

The pattern of the official Club Sweater will shortly be displayed in the bar and this Sweater will be available from Messrs. Tyson's where a member of the Club, Mr. Michael Allen will give Members any help they require. It is hoped also to have available shortly a new Club Cap with the official crest. Further information will be passed on to Members on this subject when it becomes available.

I would like to take this opportunity of wishing you, personally, a successful season and at the same time ask you not to forget the Stewarding of the dances. This only involves duty at one dance in four while Stewards are granted a Concession Ticket for themselves and partner on the nights they are not on duty. I would ask those who are willing to undertake this very important work to give their names to Mr. Dexter.
