PLAY CONDITIONS FOR COMPETITION

The Playing Conditions for First Class matches in the United Kingdom will apply except where specified below.

Duration

The matches will consist of one innings per side and each innings will be limited to 60 overs. The matches are intended to be completed in one day, but three days will be allocated in case of weather interference.

Hours of Play

Normal hours will be 10.30 a.m. to 7.30 p.m. The Umpires may order extra time if, in their opinion, a finish can be obtained on any day.

Intervals

Lunch 12.45 p.m.—1.25 p.m.
Between innings 10 minutes
Tea (20 minutes). In an uninterrupted match at 4.00 p.m. or after 25 overs of the side batting second, whichever is the later.

Covering of the Pitch

The Pitch will be completely covered in the event of rain.

Limitations of overs by any one Bowler

No bowler may bowl more than 12 overs in an innings. In the event of a bowler breaking down and being unable to complete an over, the remaining balls will be bowled by another bowler. Such part of an over will count as a full over only in so far as each bowler's limit is concerned.

The Result

(a) A Tie

In the event of a tie, following will apply:-

- The side losing the lesser number of wickets shall be the winner.
- If both sides are all out, the side with the higher overall scoring rate shall be the winner.
- If the result cannot be decided by (a) or (b), the winner shall be the side with the higher score after 30 overs, or if still equal, after 20 overs.

THE RESULTS

Durham became the first Minor County to defeat a first-class county when they beat Yorkshire at Harrogate by 5 wickets in 1973. Lincolnshire became the second when they beat Glamorgan at Swansea by 6 wickets in 1974, and Hertfordshire the third when they beat Essex at Hitchin by 33 runs in 1976.

The quickest finishes so far in the competition are:

- 2.20 p.m. Worcestershire beat Lancashire by 9 wickets (Worcester) 1963.
2.20 p.m. Essex beat Middlesex by 8 wickets (Westcliff) 1972.

The largest victory by a margin of runs is 214; Leicestershire 287-4 v Staffordshire 73 (Longton) 1975.

The following matches were completed with the scores level and under the rules of the competition, were regarded as won by the side that had lost least wickets:

- Nottinghamshire 215 v Somerset 215-9 (Taunton) 1964.
Surrey 196 v Sussex 196-8 (Oval) 1970.
Somerset 287-6 v Essex 287 (Taunton) 1978.

The match between Yorkshire and Cambridgeshire at Castleford in 1967 was the first instance of a match being decided on a shortened number of overs. Each innings was limited to 10 overs. Middlesex v Somerset (Lord's) 1977 (15 overs) was the second instance. Four matches have now been decided on a shortened number of overs.

THE SIDES

The highest innings total in the competition is:

371—4 off 60 overs Hampshire v Glamorgan (Southampton) 1975.

The highest innings total by a side batting first and losing is:

292—5 off 60 overs Warwickshire v Somerset (Taunton) 1978.

The lowest completed innings totals in the competition is:

41 (3 times) Cambridgeshire v Buckinghamshire (Cambridge) 1972. Middlesex v Essex (Westcliffe) 1972, Shropshire v Essex (Wellington), 1974.
